***We feed all students that wish to participate in the meal program at SPRP and receive reimbursement accordingly. The enrollment of any RSU 34 resident attending SPRP is reflected in the enrollment of the RSU 34 schools they would attend if not at SPRP. There were four RSU residents enrolled at SPRP in September. All four of those students qualified for meal benefits.**

COMMODITIES

On the 1st of October we were offered and accepted the following USDA items for delivery in November: grapes, peaches, pears, fruit mix, raisins, beef patties, beef crumbles, American cheese, chicken and peas. Items ordered for delivery in September that were canceled included turkey roasts fruit mix, ground beef and only half the squash ordered. The value of the canceled product has been added back to our PAL. Terri Fitzgerald, in Augusta, anticipates a year similar to last where schools cannot spend their PAL due to product offered not being available as the result of weather, production and/or delivery problems.

VERIFICATION

The yearly verification process for auditing meal applications has begun. The sample this year includes five households selected from the error prone applications as required by regulation. There are eight students in the five households that attend OTHS, LMS and several of the elementary schools.

Three families have responded to date with one family experiencing a change in meal status due to income higher than originally reported.

FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLE PROGRAM AT OTES

Offerings for the month of September and into the first part of October have included: Fuji apples, Golden Delicious apples, Granny Smith apples, blueberries, carrot and celery sticks with dip, snow peas with dip, pineapple spears and orange wedges.
