We are moving along in Unit 3 in our Everyday Math program, Unit 9 in Spelling, as well as making great gains as growing readers in the Fifth Grade classroom. Currently during our Writing Block, the class is working on writing biographies of famous people in history. There are several requirements to this on-going Social Studies Project. I will be sending home a rubric that explains what is expected on Monday. If you have any questions, feel free to contact me at school.

I have said it many times, but it really bears repeating. Consistent review of multiplication facts with your child at home is strongly encouraged. The Everyday Math program is a great program aimed at teaching your child mathematical concepts as a whole. However, in order for your child to succeed to

their highest potential, eliminate stress and participate fully in class, repeated practice of these basic skills are crucial. Please take a few minutes at home whenever possible to help them get these facts into their memory banks!

Just as a reminder...planners are sent home each night with your child. The expectation is to have them signed by someone at home that night. The students who return them signed the next day will receive a check mark. An additional check is also given for completed (and returned) homework. At the end of the week, students who have checks for the whole week...receive a Dyer Dollar. These can be redeemed for various prizes in the classroom.

A homework assignment is typically given out each day, in addition to reading for 25 minutes each night. When we return from Thanksgiving Break the reading time expectation will be increased!

Parents/Guardians:

This letter is to inform you that our community is experiencing an increase in influenza-like illness consistent with novel influenza virus (H1N1). We would like to inform you of current recommendations for decreasing the spread of influenza.

Our focus is on prevention of influenza among school students, staff and families. We encourage all families and staff to take these steps to stay healthy.

- Stay home if you are ill.
- Cough and sneeze into your elbow, or into a tissue. Throw this tissue away.
- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water, but especially after coughing and sneezing. Alcohol-based hand gels can also be used.
- Avoid touching your nose, mouth, and eyes. Germs can be spread by touching contaminated surfaces and then touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Avoid contact with ill persons.
- Get vaccinated with both seasonal influenza vaccine and H1N1 influenza vaccine.

Also, be aware of steps we can also take to identify early ill students and staff:

- A person who develops a fever of 100 degrees or above with either cough or sore throat, should remain at home.
- A person with these symptoms should remain at home until he/she is fever-free for a full 24 hours, without the use of fever reducing medication.
- A student or staff person may remain in school unless he/she becomes ill with a fever.
